

Local and Regional Business Engagement

Overview

Wylfa Newydd represents a multibillion pound investment in Anglesey and North Wales. It is one of the UK and Wales' largest major infrastructure projects and together with our supply chain we will need to source and procure an extensive and varied range of goods, products and services over the lifetime of the Power Station.

Horizon is committed to an aspiration of spending 60% of the Project value in the UK throughout the lifecycle of the Project. We shall continue to engage with the business community to maximise the use of capable and competitive local and regional businesses on our Project that will help to ensure that business growth is realised within local communities.



We have already successfully secured contracts with businesses on Anglesey and across North Wales, to support contracts such as demolition works, ecology surveys, ground investigation studies, archaeological evaluation surveys, site security, facilities and waste management.

A major boost is the Isle of Anglesey County Council's highways and engineering framework contract, which in collaboration

with Horizon, will procure and deliver new highways, highway improvements and other civil works required by the Council and Horizon. The first set of successful bids were awarded to 11 companies in June 2016 - eight of the companies are based in North Wales, demonstrating how local companies can compete and win these important contracts.

Supply Chain Charter

We published our Supply Chain Charter in July 2015, to ensure we keep engaging with businesses and to encourage our suppliers to adhere to our ethos and values. The charter sets out our principles, expectations and behaviours with respect to the supply chain.

Case study:

Archaeology survey work

With the help of ten North Wales businesses, Horizon and heritage specialists Wessex Archaeology have carried out a critical first phase of archaeological survey works across the Power Station Site on Anglesey over the past six months.
